Currently, applying for two grants with priority areas of e-cigs/vaping and marijuana prevention. Response from both of the grants should occur in June and September. -Schools are planning the mock car crashes for April/May to remind individuals of the dangers of drinking and driving. -Marshfield Clinic Health System is sponsoring an E-Cigarettes and Our Youth: Partners in Prevention workshop in Eau Claire (May 29) and Wausau (May 30) from 9:00am – 3:00pm. <p>Policy Planning</p>	<p>1.Update Excessive Intoxication ordinance diversion program</p> <p>Julia Sherman (Wi Alcohol Policy Center in Madison) contacted Captain Melby, LaCrosse Police Department, and Dr. Deb Murray, Viterbo, to share their diversion program. The program was developed to avoid prosecution by taking an alcohol awareness course based in motivational interviewing. Law Enforcement were instructed by Dr. Murray on motivational interviewing & then developed on 2 hour class. They did a practice run on one of Dr. Murray’s classes while she observed & then adjusted based on recommendations. Ultimately finalizing it and getting Dr. Murray’s stamp of approval that it was rooted in motivational interviewing. They focused on motivational interviewing since it is recognized as an evidence based practice.</p> <p>2.Share research on Commercial Quadricycles or Pedal Pubs: Municipal Options</p>	



	<p>A handout provided by the Wisconsin Alcohol Policy Project (https://law.wisc.edu/wapp/pedal_pub_analysis.pdf) highlights the legality of “pedal pubs” and what a municipality can adopt.</p> <p>Joanna shared insight on Marshfield’s ordinance approved by their Common Council that allows quadricycles — known also as party bikes or by the brand Pedal Pubs — but puts restrictions on their use in Marshfield. If the city hadn’t acted, the vehicles would have been allowed by state law anyway. The city’s ordinance does not allow the operator of a quadricycle to sell alcohol. The passengers can have and consume up to 36 ounces of a malt substance, such as beer, according to the ordinance. The vehicles can operate only from dawn until dusk. Without the city ordinance, the state law allows the cycles to operate until 10:30 p.m.</p> <p>City of Altoona’s Management Analyst shared research is being conducted on other ordinance’s with approved quadricycles with particular thought to sections relating to licensing (for the business and operator), insurance, operating restrictions/conditions, and safety standards.</p> <p>Recently in the news, Wisconsin Dells discusses pedal pub ordinance.
